collection of seven related pieces of short fiction by american author william faulkner sometimes considered a novel the most prominent character and unifying voice is that of isaac mccaslin uncle ike who lives to be an old man uncle to half a county and father to no one is about 1859 cass lives with his grand uncles theophilus and amos mccaslin called uncle buck and uncle buddy respectively by most of the characters in the book the story opens with the news that toms slave on the mccaslin plantation has run away but this is not the first time this has happened and uncle buck and buddy know where he always goes to hubert beauchamp s neighboring plantation to see his love a slave named tennie beauchamp himself has an unmarried sister sophonisba nicknamed sibbey who seems romantically interested in buck forced to stay the night to look for toms s turl buck and cass accidentally end up in sophonisba s room thinking it to be their room this situation is exploited by hubert who tries to pressure buck into marrying sophonisba but buck does not agree to hubert s exploitive interpretation of events buck and buddy and hubert settle both their situation and that of toms s turl by tying the outcome of a poker match if buck loses he is to marry sophonisba if he must agree to buy the slave girl tennie so turl will stop running away to see her buck loses but coaxes hubert into allowing another game to be played against buddy to determine the marriage and property issues the terms are changed many times but in the end buddy wins and the mccaslin family gets tennie for free old isaac mccaslin heard this story relating events that took place before he was born from his older cousin mccaslin edmonds who was 16 years his senior and like a father to him a young child edmonds mccaslin edmonds rides with his uncle buck to the neighboring plantation of hubert beauchamp in pursuit of an escaped slave the slave toms always runs away frequently to visit tennie a slave of the beauchamps with whom he is in love toms s turl eludes mccaslin and uncle buck who are forced to rely on the leisurely hubert beauchamp for help they are forced to have dinner with beauchamp and his sister sophonisba sibbey who is looking for a husband and has uncle buck in mind hubert and buck search

through the woods for turl and make a 500 dollar bet over whether he will be caught outside tennie s cabin that night that night he is in the cabin but he runs past them and eludes capture buck and you mccaslin are forced to spend the night at the plantation house but the boy accidentally go into the wrong bedroom and discover sophia lying in the bed she wakes up and screams and beauchamp takes advantage of the situation to try to pressure buck to marry sophia buck rejects the idea angrily and the two men play cards to settle a single hand of poker will decide whether buck will have to marry sophonisba and also who has to buy the other s slave since the s with tennie and tomy s turl is clearly unmanageable as it is buck the hand and sends mccaslin home to fetch buck s twin brother b legendary poker player buddy arrives and coaxes beauchamp into another poker game they spend a great deal of time hammering out stakes but in the end beauchamp folds and buddy wins the game buck uncle buddy mccaslin tennie and tomy s turl return to the plantation tennie and tomy s turl will be married

Intruder in the Dust 1986 the universality of William Faulkner's vision was perhaps most formally recognized in 1950 when he was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature but even beyond the basic human truths embodied in the people and terrain of Yoknapatawpha County there is a special kinship between Faulkner's novels and stories of the defeated South and the culture of postwar Japan itself reeling from the shock of surrender and reconstruction at the hands of a foreign army reflecting this kinship Faulkner Studies in Japan brings together some of the critical essays on Faulkner published in Japan in recent years along with discussions by several of Japan's leading novelists of Faulkner's influence on their work the collection includes an essay on broad aspects of Faulkner's writing the influence of T. Go Down, Moses (1934) in response to the devastating trauma of world war I. British and American authors wrote about grief, the need to articulate loss, inspired moving novels by Virginia Woolf and William Faulkner. Woolf criticized the role of Britain in the war to end all wars. Faulkner recognized in postwar France a devastation of land and people he found familiar from his life in Mississippi still recovering from the American Civil War. In character and mourning, Erin Penner shows how these two modernist novelists took on the challenge of rewriting the literature of mourning for a new and difficult era. Faulkner and Woolf address the massive war losses from the perspective of the noncombatant, thus reimagining modern mourning by refusing to let war poets dominate the larger cultural portrait of the postwar period. These novelists negotiated a relationship between soldiers and civilians, a relationship that was crucial once the war had ended, highlighting their sustained attention to elegiac reinvention over the course of their writing careers.
