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of a civilized society when the entire household is shipwrecked and stranded on a desert island a new social order emerges with comic results for master and servant this classic english comedy written by the author of peter pan combines light entertainment with serious undertones concerning the class structure of british society during the early twentieth century first produced in 1902 the play was adapted for radio and television and has been frequently revived on the stage the english production of this play in 1902 starred henry irving in 1903 the play was produced on broadway by charles frohman starring william gillette the story of the play concerns an aristocratic english family who revert to the state of nature when shipwrecked on a desert island while there they are willing slaves to their former butler but on return to civilization the positions are shifted james matthew barrie more commonly known as j m barrie was a scottish author and dramatist he is best remembered for creating peter pan the boy

who refused to grow up which he based on his friends the llewelyn davies boys he is also credited with popularising the name wendy which was very uncommon before he gave it to the heroine of peter pan barrie s most famous and enduring work peter pan or the boy who wouldn t grow up had its first stage performance on 27 december 1904 this play introduced audiences to the name wendy which was inspired by a young girl margaret henley who called barrie friendly but could not pronounce her rs very well and so it came out as fwendy it has been performed innumerable times since then was developed by barrie into the 1911 novel peter and wendy and has been adapted by others into feature films musicals and more the english production of this play in 1902 starred henry irving in 1903 the play was produced on broadway by charles frohman starring william gillette the story of the play concerns an aristocratic english family who revert to the state of nature when shipwrecked on a desert

island while there they are willing slaves to their former butler but on return to civilization the positions are shifted a moment before the curtain rises the hon ernest woolley drives up to the door of loam house in mayfair there is a happy smile on his pleasant insignificant face and this presumably means that he is thinking of himself he is too busy over nothing this man about town to be always thinking of himself but on the other hand he almost never thinks of any other person probably ernest s great moment is when he wakes of a morning and realises that he really is ernest for we must all wish to be that which is our ideal we can conceive him springing out of bed light heartedly and waiting for his man to do the rest he is dressed in excellent taste with just the little bit more which shows that he is not without a sense of humour the dandiacal are often saved by carrying a smile at the whole thing in their spats let us say ernest left cambridge the other day a member of the athenaeum which he would be sorry to have you

confound with a club in london of the same name he is a bachelor but not of arts no mean epigrammatist as you shall see and a favourite of the ladies he is almost a celebrity in restaurants where he dines frequently returning to sup and during this last year he has probably paid as much in them for the privilege of handing his hat to an attendant as the rent of a working man s flat he complains brightly that he is hard up and that if somebody or other at westminster does not look out the country will go to the dogs he is no fool he has the shrewdness to float with the current because it is a labour saving process but he has sufficient pluck to fight if fight he must a brief contest for he would soon be toppled over he has a light nature which would enable him to bob up cheerily in new conditions and return unaltered to the old ones his selfishness is his most endearing quality if he has his way he will spend his life like a cat in pushing his betters out of the soft places and until he is old he will be fondled in the process he gives his hat to one

footman and his cane to another and mounts the great staircase unassisted and undirected as a nephew of the house he need show no credentials even to crichton who is guarding a door above it would not be good taste to describe crichton who is only a servant if to the scandal of all good houses he is to stand out as a figure in the play he must do it on his own as they say in the pantry and the boudoir we are not going to help him we have had misgivings ever since we found his name in the title and we shall keep him out of his rights as long as we can even though we softened to him he would not be a hero in these clothes of servitude and he loves his clothes how to get him out of them it would require a cataclysm to be an indoor servant at all is to crichton a badge of honour to be a butler at thirty is the realisation of his proudest ambitions he is devotedly attached to his master who in his opinion has but one fault he is not sufficiently contemptuous of his inferiors we are immediately to be introduced to this solitary

failing of a great english peer this perfect butler then opens a door and ushers ernest into a certain room at the same moment the curtain rises on this room and the play begins it is one of several reception rooms in loam house not the most magnificent but quite the softest and of a warm afternoon all that those who are anybody crave for is the softest this study will endeavor to present in simple and concise form a survey of this continuous dramatic movement from its earliest recorded expression to contemporary moments under a single cover since to know thoroughly the dramatic output of any one period might command the industry of a lifetime the task is a colossal one and precludes any pretense at completeness the treatment is suggestive rather than informative and should be supplemented by a study of the plays indicated under each section after all the important thing is not the painful piling of fact upon fact but gaining an intelligent working knowledge of the whole and knowing exactly

where to turn for detail when it is needed the information has been gathered from many works upon the various phases to which the writer is deeply indebted all of which are indicated in the bibliographies we purpose then to take a sort of cook s tour over the whole domain of the drama touching the main points of interest and leaving the reader to return and explore at leisure the highly successful comedy of social mores set at the opening of the 20th century tweeny you bothered that day long ago when we saw a ship passing the island how we all ran like crazy folk into the water daddy and screamed and held out our arms they are both a little agitated but it sailed away and we ve never seen another lord loam if we had had the electrical contrivance we have now we could have attracted that ship s notice their eyes rest on a mysterious apparatus that fills a corner of the hall a touch on that lever tweeny and in a few moments bonfires would be blazing all round the shore this article is about the play for the person known as the

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sir james matthew barrie 1st baronet om was born in kirriemuir angus the ninth of ten children on may 9th 1860 from early formative experiences barrie knew that he wished to follow a career as an author his family wished otherwise and sought to persuade him to choose a profession such as the ministry the compromise was that he would attend university to study literature at the university of edinburgh he graduated with an m a on april 21st 1882 his first job was as a staff journalist for the nottingham journal the london editor of the st james s gazette liked that scotch thing in barrie s short stories about his mother s early life they also served as the basis for his first novels barrie though was increasingly drawn to working in the theatre his first play a biography of richard savage was only performed once and critically

panned undaunted he immediately followed this with ibsen s ghost in 1891 a parody of ibsen s plays hedda gabler and ghosts barrie s third play walker london in 1892 led to an introduction to his future wife a young actress by the name of mary ansell the two became friends and she helped his family to care for him when he fell very ill in 1893 and 1894 barrie proposed and they were married in kirriemuir on july 9th 1894 by some accounts the relationship was unconsummated and indeed the couple had no children the story of peter pan had begun to formulate when barrie became acquainted with the llewelyn davis family in 1897 meeting george jack and baby peter with their nanny in london s kensington gardens in 1901 and 1902 barrie had back to back theatre successes with quality street and the admirable crichton the character of peter pan first appeared in the little white bird in 1902 this most famous and enduring of his works peter pan or the boy who wouldn t grow up had its first stage performance on

december 27th 1904 peter pan would overshadow everything written during his career he continued to write for the rest of his life contributing many other fine and important works sir james matthew barrie 1st baronet om died of pneumonia on june 19th 1937 and was buried at kirriemuir next to his parents and two of his siblings the admirable crichton is a comic stage play written in 1902 by j m barrie sir james matthew barrie 1st baronet om was a scottish novelist and playwright best remembered today as the creator of peter pan he was born and educated in scotland and then moved to london where he wrote a number of successful novels and plays this exceptional collection explores the mutual concerns of dramatic theater film and those who comment on them plays movies and critics opens with an original play by don delillo in the form of an interview delillo s short play works as a kind of paradigm of the theatrical or cinematic event and serves as a keynote for the volume delillo s
